Update from DEC

Protecting New York's Waters from Aquatic Invasive Species This Fishing Season

While fishing this season, you can take steps to protect your waters from aquatic invasive species (AIS). AIS can out compete native species, damage economies and ecosystems, and negatively impact recreation. Follow these guidelines to help prevent the spread of AIS.

Clean, Drain, and Dry fishing equipment. AIS such as hydrilla, spiny waterflea, and didymo can be carried between water bodies on fishing equipment. Before moving to a new location and after you've finished fishing:

- *Clean plants and mud from fishing gear, boots, and waders and put it in the trash. Consider using rubber boots with studs rather than felt-soled waders, which can be difficult to clean.*
- *Drain water from gear and bait buckets onto land. If keeping bait, drain the water and replace it with spring water or dechlorinated tap water.*
- *Dry your equipment with a towel or let it air dry.*

Use bait responsibly. Properly using and disposing of bait can prevent the spread of diseases and AIS. Purchase certified bait to make sure it's disease-free. After fishing, dispose of unused bait in the trash rather than

throwing it into a water body.

Artificial Bait

Speaking of the proper disposal of bait . . . OLA Director Bill Alexander encourages us to pay attention to artificial bait, as well. Anglers should "stop throwing their old baits in the water," Alexander writes. He sent along this photo of a lake trout (from Cayuga Lake) that had been cleaned. You can see that the fish contained dozens of plastic baits that it had ingested. We are hearing about more and more fish who are impacted by these artificials that have been tossed into the lake. Please be sure to dispose of these baits in land-based trash receptacles.



Youth Fishing Derby

OLA Director Matt Kazmierski has kicked off our First Annual OLA Youth Fishing Derby.

May 1, 2024 - December 31, 2024

Eligibility:

Up to 15 yrs old

Must be child or grand child of OLA Member

Rules

1. Fish must be caught on Oneida Lake east of Route 81 Bridge and tributaries up to first impossible barrier
2. Fish must be caught during the regular season for each species.
3. The longest fish in the following categories will receive a trophy and fishing prize package: walleye, yellow perch, largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, pickerel, non-gamefish (carp, drum, catfish, etc..)

Entries must submit the following information to
president@oneidalakeassociation.org :

- One photo of the fish with the child and one with the fish on a ruler with the length clearly visible
- Date of catch, length of catch, species.
- Name and age of child, name of OLA member.
- Entries must be submitted by an adult 18 years or older.
- All Entries must be received by December 31, 2024.
