





Salt Brine Not Just for Thanksgiving Turkeys

Snow is in the forecast for Central New York. If part of your snow removal regimen is to sprinkle rock salt on your driveway and sidewalks, the NYS Division of Water encourages you to try a new "recipe" to maintain safe walkways while protecting our waters.

The ingredients are simply rock salt and tap water. [The NYS Department of Transportation uses the same recipe](#) on a larger scale for roadways across New York. SALT BRINE RECIPE

Salt brine isn't just for Thanksgiving turkeys. You can use a combination of rock salt and water, and apply it to your driveway and walkways to keep it ice free.

- Combine 3.5 cups of rock salt per gallon of hot tap water.
- Stir until all salt is dissolved.
- Pour the brine into a regular garden sprayer and spray in a zig-zag pattern over desired area.
- Save extra brine to use later.




Fall Clean Up
